Welcome to Reception

Starting school is an important milestone, not only for your child but also for you and your wider family. At St. John's we recognise that this can be an unsettling time for all concerned. You may be excited, or perhaps a little worried about how your child will cope with taking these first steps towards more independence, and how they will settle into a new and different routine. We want to reassure you that your child's happiness is of the utmost importance to us, and we will do all that we can to ensure that we create a happy and safe environment where all children can reach their full potential. We appreciate that you are your child's first and most important educators, and value the enormous contribution you make to your child's learning. By working together and developing an excellent home/school partnership from the earliest opportunity it will enable us to make sure that your child receives the best possible start to their education, and has firm foundations upon which to build.

The Reception class is part of the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS). The children learn by playing and exploring, by being active and through creative and critical thinking; which takes place both indoors and outside. This stage of their learning builds on the skills they have been developing during their time in nursery or pre-school settings. The children will spend their time engaged in a mixture of adult focused activities and activities they have chosen for themselves, where they will practise and reinforce the skills they are being taught. As the year progresses their learning will become more formal to help to prepare them for Year 1 and the next stage of their education.

[Areas of Learning](#)

There are seven areas of learning and development that shape educational provision in the EYFS. All of these areas of learning are important and are inter-connected. There are three Prime Areas and four Specific Areas.

The three Prime Areas, which are particularly important for developing children's curiosity and enthusiasm for learning are:

Communication and Language

This involves giving children opportunities to experience a language rich environment, to develop their confidence and skills in expressing themselves, and to speak and listen in a range of situations. Activities to develop excellent speaking and listening skills are focused on from the earliest opportunity.

Physical Development

This involves providing opportunities for young children to be active and interactive, and to develop their co-ordination, control and movement. They develop both their gross and fine motor skills in readiness for writing, cutting and using tools. Children must also be helped to understand the importance of physical activity, good dental hygiene and how to make healthy choices in relation to food and lifestyle choices.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

This area of the curriculum concerns the children's emotional wellbeing. It involves helping children to develop a positive sense of themselves and others, to form positive relationships and develop respect for others, to develop social skills and learn how to manage their feelings, to understand appropriate behaviour in groups, and to have confidence in their own abilities. This area of the curriculum forms an integral part of everything we do in school and is key to the children feeling happy and confident in their learning and their wider school life.

The curriculum also includes the four Specific Areas of learning. These are;

Literacy

Literacy development involves encouraging children to link sounds and letters and to begin to read and write. Children will develop their phonic skills, knowing which letters represent each spoken sound, learning how to blend these sounds together to read simple words, then sentences. They will also learn how to segment (or break down words into sounds) in order to write words then sentences. They will also begin to learn how to read and write words which cannot be blended or "sounded out" which we call "Tricky Words". Children will be given access to a wide range of reading materials (books, poems and other written materials) to ignite their interest in reading, as the ability to read accurately, fluently and with good understanding is a vital skill and central to future life success. At St. John's we are committed to ensuring that all children are equipped with this ability and develop the love of reading widely and often, both for pleasure and acquiring information.

Mathematics

Mathematics involves providing the children with opportunities to develop and improve their skills in counting, understanding and using numbers, making calculations – beginning to understand and use the language of addition and subtraction, and doubling and halving, solving mathematical problems and also develop an understanding of shapes and simple ways of measuring – i.e. looking at length, weight, capacity, time and money. The children are encouraged to solve problems in a practical concrete way before moving on to more abstract concepts. Numbers and shapes form part of our everyday environment and the children are encouraged to notice these and their relationships in their everyday experiences and play.

Understanding the World

This involves guiding the children to make sense of their physical world and their local and wider community through opportunities to explore, observe and find out about people, places and the

environment. The children will have the opportunity to visit a variety of places in the local area and have a range of visitors into school. The children will also have access to a range of simple computer programmes and are taught how to use these safely. Beginning to learn about using computers and the internet safely too.

Expressive Arts and Design

This aspect looks at the development of the children's imagination in art, music, movement, dance, role play, design technology and stories. It involves enabling children to explore and play with a wide range of media and materials, as well as providing opportunities and encouragement for sharing their thoughts, ideas and feelings through a variety of activities. It leads the children to explore texture, form, shape and space in 2 and 3 dimensions.

Home Learning

Each Friday your child will receive their green "Working Together Book". This will contain a weekly letter which will tell you what your child has been learning that week, and may also include special dates for diaries and any upcoming events. There will also be a parental response box at the bottom of each letter suggesting how you can support your child with their learning at home, and may suggest activities you could try. Please take some time to read the letter, sign it and make a comment in the box and please return the book to school by the following Wednesday. We love to hear what the children have been learning at home and what skills they have been practising, and we'd love you to send us messages and any photos so we can share in their home learning. Our role play area changes with our topics and to follow the children's interests. We may have a café, a vets, a post office or even Santa's letter writing station!




Our reading den also changes with our topics, favourite book or current author.

Our Small World area and our Prayer Corner, when we want to spend a quiet moment to ourselves.




Our Creative Area where we can design models, paint, use play dough or make a collage.
