Introduction

In April 2013, the Government announced new funding of 150 million for Physical (PE) and Sport. This funding was to be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and Sport provision. Schools were free to determine how best to use the funding, ensuring that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

In 2017, the Government announced extra funding for PE and Sport in schools with a renewed vision: All pupils leaving primary school physical literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and long-life participation in physical activity and sport. Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. Schools should use the additional funding to:

- Develop or add to the PE and sport activities that the school already offers.
- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils in future years.
