PE and Sports Premium Strategy 2023-2024

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Introduction

In April 2013, the Government announced new funding of 150 million for Physical (PE) and Sport. This funding was to be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and Sport provision. Schools were free to determine how best to use the funding, ensuring that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

In 2017, the Government announced extra funding for PE and Sport in schools with a renewed vision: All pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and long-life participation in physical activity and sport.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. Schools should use the additional funding to:

- Develop or add to the PE and sport activities that the school already offers.
- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils in future years.

Key Achievements to Date	Areas to Improve and Baseline Evidence of Need
Free after school sporting provision for all children in KS1 and KS2.	Physical Fitness – levels have improved greatly across the school during this academic year due to OPAL increasing the physical activity of breaktimes. Maintaining this is continues to be a focus for the 23-24 academic year. A key aim for 23 -24 is to reinstate The Daily Mile and Walking Wednesday across KS2.
Retaining the Platinum School Games Mark in July 2023.	Swimming – children’s progress in this area continues to be weaker than in other areas of the P.E. curriculum.
All class teachers now deliver at least 1 session of P.E. a week, and report feeling confident in their ability to deliver high quality P.E. lessons.	Personal Best challenges – Young to support their peers to improve on personal bests during Walking Wednesday; OPAL Leader led challenges at lunchtimes.
End point assessment documents are now in place and have been used by class teachers and P.E. HLTAs to carry out effective assessment of learning in P.E in the 22-23 academic year.	Pupil Voice - use questionnaires to ensure that our curriculum and extra-curricular provision is tailored precisely to the wants and needs of our young people.
Staff who supervise swimming have implemented very effective tracking systems and school have been much better informed on children’s progress as a result.	Attendance at out of school sporting events to be increased in the 23 – 24 academic year.
OPAL scheme has been implemented for meaningful, active playtimes. Children are now significantly more active during playtimes, and are able to consider and manage risks during these outdoor play and learning sessions. School received an Ofsted Outstanding rating in October 2022. P.E. was a subject that received a deep dive.	
Every child participated in a sporting competition this academic year (a combination of intra- and inter-school events)	
Effective community links have been established with a range of agencies, including Darlington Football Club, Physique Health Club and Judo Dan, to provide children with a wide range of sporting opportunities and exit routes into community based physical activity.
